## Minutes of the monthly meeting of Ludgvan Parish Council held on Wednesday 14 August 2024 at 6.45pm at the Murley Hall, Ludgvan.

	Councillors absent: Cllrs Price-Jones.

	Cllr Malone-Lee advised that she lives on the traffic consultation route and has sought advice, that she is able to participate and vote on this item, also that early observations had been circulated prior to the meeting and that she approached this item with an open mind

	A local resident attended to advise of a planning application which would be submitted and gave their contact details for questions, as they would not be able to attend the September meeting.			
	A resident of Church Hill gave their views on the proposed double yellow lines on Church Hill, meaning that the resident of No.10 would have no on-road or off-road parking at their house. As a carer the speaker was concerned at the potential impact on them and the person they care for.			
	A resident of Church Hill raised concern at the proposed pedestrian improvements. They advised that the pavement has the potential to be much wider if earth cleared from it, for the benefit of pedestrians. The proposed double yellow lines would severely impact their quality of life, taking away the ability to park outside their own property, working 7 days a week and needing parking in order to be able to continue to work and have a decent quality of life.			
	It was noted that the lorries from the quarry also need to earn a living and so there is scope for motorists to give way to one another.			
	There was a call for representatives from Cormac to meet with local residents on site to hear their concerns.			
	A resident of Church Hill spoke on their concerns at the proposed double yellow lines on the residential side of Church Hill. Although the scheme is titled 'pedestrian improvements', the benefits to pedestrians were not clear.			
	A speaker from Trethorne Court spoke on their concerns at the proposals set out in the current Cormac consultation. When funerals are held, there are only two parking spaces available.			

	Parking is needed for residents, visitors, tradespeople, without risk of getting a parking ticket. The proposal for a further two parking spaces to be removed, and a new wide pavement encouraging people to cross at the most dangerous location along the road. The safest place to cross in the square is in the middle, next to the noticeboard.

	Questions – refuse problems. Missing collections, and difficulty in getting the old green bins collected.			
	Question – Marazion, Carbis Bay, Mexico Towans, no enforcement of dogs on beaches. Enforcement and better signage is needed. Noted by Cornwall Councillors.			
	Cornwall Councillor Andrew George reported that:			
	- Has received many representations on the proposed pedestrian improvements, consultation by Cormac. Keen to make sure that highways engineers listen to what the local community have had to say. Have not yet heard from the school for their views on the proposals around the school area. For the highways solutions to be effective, enforcement would be needed, noting that this is already an issue in Lower Quarter with the existing double yellow lines.			
	- Devolution, as a newly elected MP, the 5 Cornish MPs are working together on the devolution proposal, keen for Cornwall's voice to be heard.			
	<ul> <li>Also as MP, has called for a meeting with the Hospitals Minister in September, and meeting with health officials in Cornwall and other MPs, so that all can speak for Cornwall collectively.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Have been expressing concern at the Governments plan for affordable housing and the proposed increase in housing targets, noting that this has not proven a solution for Cornwall, with a need for building to need rather than building to targets. Will be debating in September with the Housing Minister.</li> </ul>			
	<ul> <li>Large number of case work issues are being dealt with, many relating to planning enforcement.</li> </ul>			

	<ul> <li>Have been approached by a number of people regarding the two developments at Long Rock with concerns that homes will be allocated contrary to the s.106 agreements / planning conditions. Unfounded concerns have spread and then take Councillor and officer time in addressing, even though there is no basis for the concerns.</li> <li>Next A30 meeting with National Highways and other organisations to be held in September.</li> </ul>

	Infra23-056_SN01			
	Widening of the pavement at Bowglas Close. There is very little danger in crossing the road at this point. It is not seen as a priority and so not supported.			
	Unrestricted parking zone – not a priority.			
	New double yellow lines. The parish council does not think that these will bring a great improvement to pedestrian safety and there is concern that an increase in double yellow lines will reduce the amount of parking available to local residents and those attending funerals etc at the local church.			
	The proposed widened pavement at The Square would encourage pedestrians to cross the road at a dangerous location, near a blind bend.			

The parish council asks whether a traffic light system similar to a system in Newlyn would be possible – where a red light shows as a default, and only turns green when it is safe for motorists to pass.

Request a review of the temporary double yellow lines which had recently been introduced in Churchtown.

Pedestrian warning sign – if coming out of the Church entrance, these do not help pedestrians to determine if it is safe to step out onto the pavement, with the risk that vehicles have been reported to mount the pavement in this location to pass one another.

Pedestrian warning sign – will not detect a pedestrian joining the road at a mid-point (eg from the church entrance), and so having a pedestrian warning sign which does not light up at all times when there is a pedestrian, may risk making it more unsafe for pedestrians.

It is noted that bollards outside the church entrance have previously been discounted as an option, however they would seem a tangible protection for pedestrians using the footway at this location.

Extension of footway between church and White Hart – the footway at this point is very narrow and difficult to use.

Install buildouts to reduce crossing width for pedestrians / to regulate traffic – this is likely to reduce visibility and so it is not seen as an improvement. Not necessary.

A short section of double yellow lines above the allotment gateway could help to stop those visiting the allotments from parking near the blind bend at the top of Church Hill.

Buildout by the primary school. Could help to slow traffic, and so is supported as a traffic control measure.

Proposed new double yellow lines on Church Hill – the parish council does not support this proposal as the aim of this measure is not clear. To introduce double yellow lines at this location will reduce parking for residents, with no viable alternative parking options nearby. Double yellow lines would likely increase traffic speeds as parked vehicles currently act as a chicane and help reduce traffic speed.

Pavement widening by Riverside Close is not considered to be a safe proposal. It is a hairpin bend and motorists need the space for manoeuvring. If the pavement is widened, some vehicles will not be able to navigate the junction in a single manoeuvre and so there would be increased risk associated with reversing and turning in a junction.

Pavement widening on the opposite side – this is not seen as necessary or a safety improvement as pedestrians do not tend to use that pavement.

Change to double yellow lines. Supported by the Parish Council, on the Blowinghouse Hill side of the road.

Buildouts – would cause an obstruction for larger vehicles. The reasons for the buildout are not apparent and so this element is not supported. The existing space at the junction gives scope for motorists to have space to manoeuvre to check for vehicles coming.

Bus stop change – the reason for the change is not apparent. Not supported.

Removal of speed cushions – supported, it is understood that the speed cushions have limited effect, they cause increased noise nuisance.

The pre-application advice does not appear to have been included in the plans for this application. The location is not appropriate for development, the access is too narrow for a viable vehicular access. Concern at the proximity to the neighbouring properties and the potential impact to residents of existing neighbouring properties. The design of the proposed development is considered to be out of keeping with neighbouring developments. The proposal would constitute an unacceptable increase in density of building at this location. There is insufficient local infrastructure to support this development. The proposal does not meet local housing need. The access route along Back Lane is already too busy, vehicles cannot pass at the same time as pedestrians, already a concern particularly in view of proximity to children's play area.
